
FAREWELLING JOHN MURRAY

OUR ROUGH SLEEPING REPORT IS NOW AN AWARD WINNER!

Early this year a team of staff from Lifewise, Auckland City Council and Auckland City Mission interviewed a group of homeless people, their families, retailers and others about the impact of rough sleeping in our city centre.

The resulting 'Insights into Rough Sleeping' report describes what it's like to sleep rough in their own words, with creative visuals showing the 'choices' people make to be homeless.

The report won gold at the Best Design Awards. From the judges: "After we awarded this the gold, we were told a story about a rough sleeper who literally sleeps with his copy of this ground breaking piece of information design. This says it all, that something could get it so right for both agencies and for the people experiencing rough sleeping."

A GREAT START FOR 70 MORE CHILDREN

Our Vital5 Early Childhood Education programme received a great boost this year with the opening of our new Waimumu Road centre in West Auckland. This will see 70 more children aged from birth to five years old get the start in life they deserve with quality care and learning in a nurturing environment. We're thrilled to see Vital5 grow. We believe the first five years of a child's life are critical to their future health, happiness, growth, development and achievement. We'll continue to ensure this Lifewise initiative grows stronger with every year.

HATS OFF TO OUR HOMECARE STAFF

This year we celebrated our staff who had achieved a Homecare qualification or completed a training programme. We take pride in the achievements of our staff and in the knowledge that as a result we have a more confident and competent workforce proving quality services for our clients. At present, 73% of our Homecare Workers have either completed or are in the process of completing Level 2, and 34% have completed or are completing Level 3. For many of our staff, this is the first qualification they have achieved. Apart from the challenge of just finding time to complete all the work, some of them have also overcome literacy issues, or have English as a second language. We know from other workers who have completed the graduation that they feel a great sense of pride in what they have achieved, and it reflects positively on the service they deliver to our clients.

ENRICHING FAMILY LIFE

We were fortunate to have many successes within Family Services during 2015. One of these was the successful intervention with the Jones whanau, and the subsequent development of an alternative model of intervention for foster care. This year also saw Lifewise gain the Parenting through Separation contract. We've had a huge increase in the numbers attending our parenting toolbox courses and are proud of the on-going high regard in which these courses are held. We've moved to evidencebased systems to better monitor the work we do and provide outcome measures for whanau. This, along with the increased professionalism of our team, has made 2015 a great year for Family Services.

TURNING LIVES AROUND



MARIANA & AUNTIE BARB

Getting back on track after battles with addiction is tough, especially if you don't have a support network. Add a young family into the mix and with more at stake, it can be even harder. This was life for Mariana, and it was Barbara Hicks of Lifewise Rotorua (or Auntie Barb) who was there to help her get back on her feet.

Mariana was born in Rotorua but grew up in Sydney. In her late teens, things startled to unravel. "I got mixed up in the wrong scene. I got addicted to heroin." After some time on the methadone programme, Mariana returned to Rotorua to be closer to family. It was there she was introduced to Barbara. "Straight away she was Auntie Barb. She was loving, caring, a teacher. She was a shoulder to cry on."

But more than emotional support, Barbara helped Mariana with the practical skills she needed to get back on track and look after her children. Advice about budgeting, cooking, communication and more are some of the things Lifewise assists people with to help turn their lives around. In Mariana's words, "The most important thing she taught me were life skills; basic life skills. She taught me how to cook and maintain our budget with good kai. She helped me stabilise my life."

For Barbara, seeing the development in people like Mariana is what she loves about working with Lifewise. "You see progress in people. If I can see progress, it might be just an inch, I know I'm doing my job."

Lifewise provides support for those struggling with addictions and mental health issues. The service takes a Maori cultural framework, Te Ara Ora (Pathway to Wellbeing), and assists people of all cultural backgrounds. This service recognises the whole person, which we believe is the most effective way to support people.

I want to write to let you know how grateful our whanau is for what you do for our son at Royal Road Preschool. When our son started there he was really shy and didn't want me to leave him. After 18 months there with Andrea and the team he is a confident happy boy who is always up and ready for preschool (even on a Saturday). The teachers have supported him to try new things, take risks, do things for himself and be more independent. He has lots of friends at Preschool and I have also made friends through the preschool with other Mums and this has been a great support for me during some dark and difficult times. I have enjoyed being part of the PFC (Parents Family Committee). It has made me proud to make things happen at the Preschool for the teachers and the kids there. We don't have much but I am grateful for how the preschool and teachers remind us all its not about the flash stuff its about happiness, love and kindness.

MARJORIE

I am very thankful for the support that I receive from Lifewise. I feel that I would never have been able to get back on my feet without the help of Lifewise. I am a naturally organised person and Lifewise staff has showed me that I could continue being organised. Staff always treat me with dignity and respect. I find it very hard to depend on other people, however Lifewise has helped me to bridge that gap to accept that I can't do as much as in the past. Before I joined Lifewise I felt vulnerable and lonely - I feel that Lifewise has turned this around and I now feel safe and loved. I have learnt a lot from the staff and they keep me connected to the world out there. Lifewise is "my rock"!!



MARGARET

Margaret believes the old adage that "it takes a village to raise a child". She's been involved in Lifewise's foster care programme for more than seven years and, since then, has provided a happy family home to more than 40 foster children. Margaret has a seven-bedroom home (or "village", as she calls it) in Massey with her husband Michael and daughter Michelle. They recently fostered 10 children for a short period, seven siblings from one family and three from another. "Lifewise does everything possible to keep siblings together," she says. "It's important children maintain family relationships, and that's why I've continued to foster through Lifewise." Margaret and her husband Michael have four biological children. Michelle, 16, is the youngest, and it was her who initially prompted Margaret to get involved in the Lifewise foster care programme. "She came home from school with a pamphlet one day and said, 'mum, we should do this'," she says. "I come from a big family and I genuinely love children, so it seemed like a natural fit."

MICHAEL AND JANET

We both receive support from Lifewise. Mike joined Lifewise first and I joined soon after. The homecare workers that come in to support us are all good in their own way. I find it very difficult to shower Mike and the support also means that I have free time to do something else or to sometimes just take welcomed down time and relax. With the different staff coming into our house it also means that there is another friendly face that we can interact with. Both Mike and I are extremely grateful for the service. When we think of Lifewise we think: AWESOME & CARING!






FINANCIAL SUMMARY
